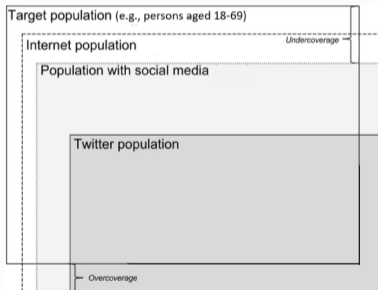
- ▶ The paper tries to answer a very interesting question about the spread of social movements against gender-based violence (GBV) on social media
- ▶ A new dataset focusing on 10 social movements against GBV on Twitter (**huge effort!**)
- ▶ Key results:
 - ▶ Social movements against GBV start suddenly and fade out quickly
 - ▶ Social leaders play an role in driving social change

- ▶ Instrument variable: verified account
 - ▶ Relevance: ✓
 - ▶ **Exclusion restriction:** not very clear that the verification status of an account affects the number of likes of a tweet ONLY through the number of followers
- ▶ Regional differences: what about other countries/regions, beside the US?

- ▶ What about other popular hashtags?
#BeenRapedNeverReported



- ▶ We need to be more cautious on the implication about social movements online due to self-selection mechanism in Twitter



- ▶ The paper can apply some methods in case of "imperfect instruments", such as: [Chan & Tobias \(2015\)](#)¹, [Nikolai et al. \(2022\)](#)²
- ▶ Another way to go is to apply partial identification to address omitted variable bias ([Emily Oster \(2019\)](#)³)
